

## Official Proceedings of the Stutsman County Commission—February 21, 2023

At 3:30 p.m., Chairman Klose called the regular meeting of the Stutsman County Commission to order. Jerry Bergquist, Chad Wolsky, Joan Morris, Steven Cichos (via phone) and Mark Klose answered the roll call.

Corry Shevlin, Vice-President of Business Development, JSDC presented South Central Dakota Regional Council Dues, the city has a \$22,969 share and the county has a \$13,489 share. Cichos made a motion to approve the payment dues subject to the review of the joint-powers agreement to verify parties and funds, seconded by Bergquist. Roll call vote: Bergquist, Wolsky, Morris, Cichos, and Klose voted aye. Motion carried.

David Bratton, Veteran Service Officer presented current and future veteran issues in Stutsman County. Many veterans from other counties have been coming to Stutsman County for care, overloading Bratton's current workload. Bratton suggested a conversation with surrounding counties due to the number of veterans coming to his office for services that Stutsman County is not reimbursed for.

Jim Wentland, Road Superintendent, asked the commission for suggestions on how to solve the employee retention issue he has had since February 5<sup>th</sup>. He presented concerns for the upcoming blizzard due to not having staff to run plows. Commissioner Cichos proposed the option of Wentland's crew to stop servicing townships and service only county roads until he can get his crew fully staffed.

Wentland has a full time and a seasonal position available. Wentland requested permission to hire two full-time employees instead of a seasonal employee. A motion was made by to hire either a seasonal or full-time employee by Bergquist, seconded by Wolsky. Roll call vote: Wolsky, Morris, Cichos, Klose, and Bergquist voted aye. Motion carried.

Wentland requested permission to award Chip Seal bid to Morris Seal Coat for \$707,998.25 for 20.68 miles. The two other bids were made by Aztec at \$747,209.24 and Bituminous at \$721,461.04. A motion to award the bid to Morris Chip Seal Coat was made by Cichos, seconded by Wolsky. Roll call vote: Morris, Cichos, Klose, Bergquist, and Wolsky voted aye. Motion carried.

As a follow-up to a question raised at the last meeting, Wentland explained why the tank rental lease agreement is a better option than purchasing. Per the lease agreement, tank maintenance is included in annual fees. The county is unable to purchase the 15 large tanks we have, and it would cost \$400 per unit to buy the smaller 7. Our lease agreement was \$3,400 for 3 years averaging approximately \$5 per day, per tank.

Shannon Davis, Human Resources Director presented a termination letter from NDPHIT. Morris voiced her concerns with an NDPHIT partnership due to being told they would no longer allow Stutsman County to terminate the agreement to have NDPHIT re-bid Stutsman County in the summer closer to budget season after being told there was nothing preventing the county from doing so. Morris and Klose wanted a comparison of cost and care for NDPHIT vs. NDPERS including what the benefits and problems for the employee, employer, and taxpayers are. The board recommends that an NDPHIT representative participate in the next commission meeting.

Jessica Alonge, Auditor/COO, presented a request for an additional 2022 budget transfer of \$21,000 coming out of the General Fund and going into Sheriff's Capital Fund to reimburse the Sheriff's Capital

Fund for donations made by outside entities for the purchase of a drone. A motion to approve the transfer of funds was made by Cichos, seconded by Wolsky. Roll call vote: Cichos, Klose, Bergquist, Wolsky, and Morris voted aye. Motion carried.

Alonge requested additional 2022 budget transfers from the General Fund into various capital funds. A motion to approve was made by Cichos, seconded by Wolsky. Roll call vote: Cichos, Klose, Bergquist, Wolsky, and Morris voted aye. Motion carried.

Alonge requested permission to change the name of Fund 98, or Cares Act Fund, to the Local Assistance and Tribal Consistency Fund. A total of \$50,000 has been received for this fund, with an additional \$50,000 expected. A motion to approve the name change and to deposit the funds was made by Morris, seconded by Bergquist. Roll call vote: Klose, Bergquist, Wolsky, Morris, and Cichos voted aye. Motion carried.

Alonge presented the budget amendments for 2022. Alonge notified the board that she added two line items for each county fund per a recommendation from the State Auditor's Office: Market Value Change Revenue Fund, which is specific to investment funds, and Bank Service Fee Expense, which has previously been included in interest but has recently been recognized as an expense. A motion to approve budget adjustments was made by Morris, seconded by Cichos. Roll call vote: Bergquist, Wolsky, Morris, Cichos, and Klose voted aye. Motion carried.

At 4:57 P.M., the Commission recessed for the County Park Board meeting.

#### Official Proceedings of the Stutsman County Park Board – February 21, 2023

At 4:58 p.m., Chairman Klose called the regular meeting of the Stutsman County Park Board to order. Jerry Bergquist, Joan Morris, Mark Klose, Steven Cichos, Chad Wolsky, Merri Mooridian and Robert Martin answered the roll call.

Brian Amundson and Randy Neva, Stutsman County residents, presented concerns shared by fellow lessees of the grazing lands. Amundson stated there are current agreements in place between the Game and Fish Department and the Bureau of Reclamation regarding the grazing lands. Neva discussed issues with fencing and who put fences up and where, and who is responsible for maintaining them. Karl Bergh, Park Superintendent, stated he would be willing to check and manage the properties within the next year. Cichos made a motion to extend the existing leases for one year at their current rate, seconded by Morris. Roll call vote: Wolsky, Morris, Cichos, Klose, Martin, Mooridian, and Bergquist voted aye. Motion carried.

Hayland bids were presented. The first bid was \$45 per acre and the second bid was \$52.50 per acre. A motion was made to accept the bid for \$52.50 by Bergquist, seconded by Mooridian. Roll call vote: Morris, Cichos, Klose, Martin, Mooridian, Bergquist, and Wolsky voted aye. Motion carried.

Bergh requested permission to purchase and install a new garage door on the shop due to the current one turning into a safety hazard caused by weight and the springs going out. The new door and installation would cost approximately \$4,500-\$5,000 which is within the park's budget. A motion to approve the purchase and installation of the new garage door in the shop was made by Bergquist, seconded by Martin. Roll call vote: Klose, Cichos, Martin, Mooridian, Bergquist, Wolsky, and Morris voted aye. Motion carried.

Bergh also discussed the Garrison grant for work in the campground. Bergh plans on setting up tent sites within the campground, which was approved at a previous meeting. He would like to add 5 RV pedestals and the wiring as well. There is money in the budget to cover the project whether the grant is approved or not. A motion to approve the addition of 5 pedestals was made by Morris, seconded by Martin. Roll call vote: Klose, Martin, Mooridian, Bergquist, Wolsky, Morris, and Cichos voted aye. Motion carried.

A motion to approve payment of the mid-month bills was made by Morris, seconded by Bergquist. Roll call vote: Martin, Mooridian, Bergquist, Wolsky, Morris, Cichos, and Klose voted aye. Motion carried.
