Official Proceedings of the Stutsman County Commission—March 19, 2024

At 8:00 a.m., Chairman Klose called the regular meeting of the Stutsman County Commission to order. Jerry Bergquist, Chad Wolsky, Mark Klose, Levi Taylor, and Joan Morris answered the roll call.

The Pledge of Allegiance was recited.

Joe Rector, Director of the JRVLS, gave an update on the library. The library board has an interest in purchasing the Masonic Building and using that in conjunction with the Alfred Dickey Library for the library system. If purchased, the Masonic Building would be open from 3:00 p.m. - 8:00 p.m. and would be mainly used as program space, with only a small library, consisting of the material that is currently at the Stutsman County Library. Alfred Dickey Library would be open 9:30 a.m. - 5:30 p.m. After receiving inspections from three engineers and an architect there is an estimate of \$2.9 million in renovations needed to make the building usable as a library. If approved, the library would look at raising the \$2.9 million for renovations prior to opening. There is a public meeting with Rector on March 19th, and a meeting with the architect scheduled for April 13th. Both meetings will be held at the Masonic Building.

Chad Kaiser, Sheriff, gave a building update and requested approval for a change order to put in a chipped, painted floor in the meeting room which will be a high traffic area. Kaiser received estimates from Lux in the amount of \$14,880 and Decorating by Charlie for \$14,700. A motion to approve the change order, not to exceed the amount of \$14,880 was made by Wolsky, seconded by Bergquist. Roll call vote: Bergquist, Wolsky, Morris, Taylor, and Klose voted aye. Motion carried.

Kaiser also requested to purchase 10 radars using the capital budget for light bars. Radars are normally purchased through a DOT grant, but that grant is no longer available. The quote for the radars is \$33,080.30. A motion to approve the purchase using the capital budget was made by Bergquist, seconded by Taylor. Roll call vote: Wolsky, Morris, Taylor, Klose, and Bergquist voted aye. Motion carried.

Bergquist presented a discussion on creating a park portfolio, consisting of current park board members to assist Karl Bergh, Park Superintendent, with projects, prioritizing and a five-year plan for the parks. He feels that a portfolio of 1-3 members of the park board for Bergh to be able to turn to would be helpful for prioritizing and focusing on all parks, not just the reservoir.

Jessica Alonge, Auditor/COO, requested to change the motion from the February 20th meeting establishing a committee to review the Library MOA between Stutsman County and the City of Jamestown. At the March 4th City Council meeting the city council added that this committee is not charged with reviewing library operations or funding, only the document itself. A motion to agree with the city was made by Morris, seconded by Bergquist. Roll call vote: Morris, Taylor, Klose, Bergquist, and Wolsky voted aye. Motion carried.

Alonge presented a request to purchase election supplies using the document preservation fund. The request is for 20 tote bins for \$395 each, and a ballot jogger for \$1,045. The purchase total for the supplies is \$8,985.62. A motion to approve the purchase up to \$8,985.62 was made by Taylor, seconded by Morris. Roll call vote: Taylor, Klose, Bergquist, Wolsky, and Morris voted aye. Motion carried.

At 9:03 a.m., the Commission meeting recessed for the Park Board meeting.

Official Proceedings of the Stutsman County Park Board – March 19, 2024

At 9:03 a.m., Chairman Klose called the regular meeting of the Stutsman County Park Board to order. Jerry Bergquist, Mark Klose, Chad Wolsky, Levi Taylor, Joan Morris, and Merri Mooridian, Henry Steinberger (via telephone) answered the roll call.

A continued discussion on the park board portfolio was held. The portfolio would be a good point of contact for Bergh for any day-to-day inquiries as well. Bergh is in favor of the idea of getting some direction and feels having the portfolio would be an advantage to himself and his department. Taylor would like to move forward with the idea. Wolsky and Mooridian volunteered to be members of the portfolio.

Steinberger presented an update on the recreational trail program grant request. He is submitting applications for a water trail grant, called the James Valley Water Trail Grant, and for a motorized vehicle grant called the Dakota Skies Outdoor Recreation Area Grant. Both grants are up to \$250,000 and are 80/20 grants. Steinberger would like more public feedback and would like to hold a public meeting in April. Klose would like to have ND Parks contact the Bureau and see if the trails would fit in with the land conveyance agreement. Kaiser is supportive of the idea; his office is fully staffed, and he has 18 reserve deputies. Morris wants to make sure that there is enough money in the budget to cover the extra expenses that will be incurred by the county for these projects and maintaining the trails in the future. She also wants to make sure that the people leasing the land are informed of the possibility of the trails. A motion was made by Steinberger to hold a public input meeting on April 1st at 6:30 p.m., seconded by Wolsky. Unanimous aye vote. Motion carried.

Bergh presented a grant agreement between the park board and North Dakota Game and Fish for replacement of the courtesy dock at marina. It has been discussed and approved in a previous meeting and just needs a signature.

Bergh also presented an agreement with Game and Fish for the replacing of the Spiritwood Lake fishing pier. Dakota Anglers and Stutsman County Wildlife Club will each donate \$750, and Spiritwood Resort will donate \$3,000. A motion to approve the remaining \$1,750 for the replacement of the pier was made by Morris, seconded by Mooridian. Roll call vote: Klose, Mooridian, Steinberger, Bergquist, Wolsky, Morris, and Taylor voted aye.

A motion to approve the mid-month park bills was made by Mooridian, seconded by Morris. Roll call vote: Mooridian, Steinberger, Bergquist, Wolsky, Morris, Taylor, and Klose voted aye. Motion carried.
